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EDITORIAL

2025 will be remembered as a turning point in the history of international development cooperation. Official development assistance from donor countries fell by 23.1%, the sharpest decline ever recorded since the modern international aid system was established. The dismantling of the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), governments scaling back their commitments, and budgetary priorities shifting towards rearmament are far from temporary setbacks. Together, they reflect a profound geopolitical realignment whose impact on children's rights is already being felt: millions of children are losing access to education, healthcare and protection.

Reduced funding from the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) has limited our ability to act, while the repercussions of the United States' withdrawal have weakened the wider civil society ecosystem in which we work. We face this reality with honesty and clarity. Our response is one of determination.

This year, we launched the development of our 2027–2032 strategy, an important process that will help us define, with even greater clarity, where our presence can make the greatest and most lasting difference. At the same time, we strengthened our localisation strategy. Our 44 local partners, deeply rooted in the communities they serve, are at the heart of our approach. They ensure that our work remains relevant, sustainable and firmly grounded, whatever challenges affect international funding. In 2025, our joint efforts reached more than 200,000 children and young people in Switzerland and abroad.

Throughout this period of uncertainty, one thing has remained constant: our commitment to children's rights. Guided by rigour and humility, we continue to focus our efforts where they can have the greatest impact. After 65 years of commitment, this conviction continues to shape our decisions, and your trust enables us to remain true to it.

Thank you for your loyal support. It has never mattered more.

PROFILE

For more than sixty five years, Terre des Hommes Suisse (TdH Suisse) has worked to ensure that every child can grow up in a safe environment, access quality education and actively participate in decisions that affect them. These three dimensions – education, protection and participation – are intrinsically linked, mutually reinforcing, and lie at the heart of an integrated approach to children's rights. Based in Geneva and recognised as a public-interest organisation, TdH Suisse supports 44 local partners in 10 countries across Africa, Asia and Latin America, as well as in Switzerland.

TdH Suisse's work is built on three fundamental and complementary pillars:



Right to education

Enabling access to an adapted, free, and quality education.



Right to protection

Protecting children against all forms of violence and exploitation.



Right to a healthy environment and to participation

Encouraging children to become actors of change in their environment and communities.

AN INTEGRATED APPROACH TO ENSURING CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

At TdH Suisse, we believe that education, protection and participation cannot be separated. Together, they form the foundation of every child's right to grow up safely and shape their own future.

This integrated approach is what gives TdH Suisse its distinctive added value. By supporting local civil society organisations to deliver these three dimensions together, we help create lasting change rooted in the realities of the communities they serve.

In 2025, despite the widespread suspension of USAID funding and major cuts to development assistance across several European countries, TdH Suisse continued to strengthen this approach. We remain convinced that lasting progress for the most vulnerable children can only be achieved by advancing their rights to education, protection and participation together.

LOCALISATION FOR LASTING IMPACT

TdH Suisse's strength lies in its commitment to strengthening local civil society. We deliver our programmes exclusively through partner organisations rooted in the communities they serve, supporting them over the long term to strengthen their technical, organisational and advocacy capacities. These organisations are best placed to design and implement responses that are relevant, locally owned and sustainable. This collaboration not only ensures that our interventions respond to local needs, but also that their impact extends well beyond the lifespan of the projects by making local partners the driving force behind lasting change.

With dedicated teams in Geneva and across its international coordination offices, supported by several hundred volunteers, TdH Suisse reached more than 337,400 beneficiaries in 2025, including nearly 203,000 children and young people, across 10 countries in Switzerland and internationally. In Switzerland alone, our programmes reached more than 75,000 people, the majority of them children and young people.

EDUCATION: BUILDING THE FUTURE IN TIMES OF CRISIS



In 2025, across nine countries affected by poverty, inequality, violence and conflict, where school dropout rates remain particularly high, Terre des Hommes Suisse (TdH Suisse) and its local partners have supported nearly 113,000 children and young people in their education. These programmes enable vulnerable children to access quality education, protect them from the worst forms of child labour and early marriage, and support teenagers in their vocational training plans.

ACCESS TO INCLUSIVE, QUALITY EDUCATION

Pathways back to school for vulnerable children

Through learning support centres, our local partners help out-of-school children catch up so that they can enrol in school, while also helping children already in school stay on track and avoid dropping out. Alongside the public education system, these centres provide learning environments where every child can progress at their own pace. In India, although public school is officially compulsory and free, the reality of overcrowded classrooms leaves many children from tribal communities and urban slums with little opportunity to fully engage with learning. More than 21,300 of these children have benefited from tailored educational support adapted to their circumstances. In Peru, where many families face economic hardship that forces children to leave school early, this support enabled 6,830 young people at risk of dropping out to complete the school year. In all countries where we operate, we also play an active role in national education clusters, strengthening the voice of civil society in shaping quality education policies that promote quality learning and better outcomes for all students.

Improving teaching quality across our countries of operation

Access to school is essential, but the quality of teaching is just as crucial. In many of the countries where we operate, we have also invested in teacher training to ensure that classrooms become participatory and non-violent learning environments. In Mali, nearly 650 teachers have been trained in non-violent teaching methods across some 50 schools. In Senegal, teacher training has incorporated the use of artificial intelligence to tailor learning materials to the pace and needs of each learner.

Involving the whole community in access to education

The sustainability of successful schooling also depends on what happens beyond the classroom: within families and communities. Cultural and economic barriers, child labour, early marriage and the prioritisation of boys over girls remain the main obstacles to school attendance. This is why TdH Suisse works with parents and communities to change attitudes towards education, particularly girls' education. In Bolivia, "Parent Schools" promote positive, non-violent parenting, helping to create a protective environment for children. In Peru, around 3,000 parents took part in awareness-raising activities in 2025 on violence prevention and the importance of keeping children in school, strengthening their role as the primary guarantors of their children's right to education.

WHEN SCHOOLS BECOME SAFE HAVENS

Safe schools in conflict-affected areas

In these areas, schools become safe havens, protecting children from violence, forced recruitment by armed groups and exploitation. In Colombia, the Escuelas Seguras y Resilientes project trained 735 teachers in the Cauca region to strengthen schools' ability to withstand and respond to armed conflict. In Burkina Faso and Mali, where population displacement has reached unprecedented levels, the same approach guides our interventions. In Burkina Faso, our 20 accelerated learning centres enabled displaced children to achieve a 98.64% pass rate in the Certificat d'Études Primaires (CEP), the national primary school leaving certificate. In Mali, nearly 16,400 children remained in education thanks to school fee support for over 1,500 vulnerable children and the withdrawal of around 100 children from child labour allowing them to return to school.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING:**THE PATHWAY TO A BETTER FUTURE**

In developing countries, access to vocational qualification is often the only pathway for young people to break the cycle of poverty in the long term and build a stable future. In 2025, TdH Suisse implemented an innovative dual-certification model in Peru, enabling 80 young people to obtain a recognised vocational qualification alongside their secondary school diploma.

Integrated directly into the public school system and developed in close collaboration with local education authorities, this model opens up tangible employment opportunities for young people in vulnerable situations. It also contributes to breaking down gender stereotypes by providing equal access to all areas of specialisations. Building on these results, the education authorities have committed to strengthening this programme in 2026, with the ambition of scaling it up.

HAITI: SCHOOLS AS A LAST REFUGE

In 2025, more than 1,600 schools have closed in Haiti, depriving 243,000 children of access to education. Against this backdrop, TdH Suisse worked with local partner schools that remained open throughout the crisis to ensure continued access to education for 3,560 of the

most vulnerable children, many of whom had fled gang violence or lost their parents. Scholarships, nutritional assistance, psychosocial support and remedial classes helped students achieve pass rates of 97% to 100% in official examinations.





OUR ACTIONS FOR CHILD PROTECTION

In 2025, in contexts marked by conflict, forced displacement and daily violence, Terre des Hommes Suisse (TdH Suisse) and its partners strengthened their commitment to protecting the most exposed children. Our approach is built around prevention, early identification, and direct support for children facing violence. This year, we trained 161,900 children and young people to recognise, prevent and respond to situations of violence that threaten them.

PREVENTION: BUILDING PROTECTIVE ENVIRONMENTS

Protecting children begins before violence occurs. Our programmes invest in community mobilisation, transforming educational practices and strengthening legal frameworks. Together, these key measures help sustainably reduce children's exposure to risk.

Communities at the forefront of child protection

In Burkina Faso, in partnership with Terre des Hommes Germany, nearly 70 community protection units helped strengthen community-based vigilance and inform families about the risks of violence. In Colombia, more than 5,000 parents, teachers and community members attended awareness-raising activities on the prevention of armed recruitment, while 11,000 people took part in non-violence campaigns aimed at preventing recruitment into armed groups.

Strengthening laws for lasting protection

In Bolivia, two landmark laws were adopted in 2025: Law 1636 creates a specific criminal framework against online sexual violence targeting minors, and Law 1639 formally prohibits any marriage or cohabitation involving persons under the age of 18. These advances are the result of long-term advocacy by our local partners and TdH Suisse, carried out with the authorities through the Joining Forces Alliance in Bolivia, demonstrating civil society's capacity to embed systemic change in child protection.

IDENTIFICATION: SPOTTING AND ACTING ON WARNING SIGNS

An essential part of our work consists of strengthening the capacity of children, families and institutions to recognise warning signs and initiate reporting procedures before it is too late.

Recognising rights to provide better protection

Sometimes, protecting children starts with something as simple as securing a birth certificate. In Mali, where

forced displacement has left many children without proof of identity, nearly 300 children obtained court orders in 2025 enabling them to be officially registered. In Senegal, our partners equip children and young people with the knowledge and confidence to recognise situations of risk and seek protection, helping to bring cases of abuse and exploitation to an end.

Civil society organisations on the front line

In Colombia, 6 civil society organisations played an active role in community spaces linked to the protection of children's rights. 30 advocacy initiatives were formulated directly by children and young people on issues including access to education and the prevention of armed recruitment.

CARE: SUPPORTING CHILDREN TOWARDS A BRIGHTER FUTURE

When prevention alone is not enough, our commitment continues directly with children who have experienced violence. This involves providing a safe environment, appropriate psychological support, and long-term guidance to ensure that their past experiences do not determine the child's future.

Supporting every child victim

In Burkina Faso, community vigilance mechanisms have enabled the referral of nearly 400 children who were victims of violence to the relevant services. Across a dozen safe spaces, more than 3,800 young people have benefited from personalised psychosocial support. They have all reported an improvement in their emotional well-being and a greater ability to cope with stressful situations.

When support restores confidence

In Bolivia, our partner organisation Mujeres Creando provides women and children who are victims of violence with comprehensive legal, psychological and social support. In 2025, out of the 2,210 cases they handled, 44% resulted in convictions, protection measures or children being reunited with their families.

SENEGAL: WHEN SUPPORT RESTORES CONFIDENCE

In Senegal, where violence often goes unreported and cases are frequently settled out-of-court, EDEN's reception centre offers children who are victims of violence or abuse a safe space to speak without fear of being judged. Through psychosocial support, referrals to specialised care services, and training on children's rights

and protection mechanisms EDEN supports each child over the long term. Children receiving support report feeling more confident in recognising warning sign—suspicious behaviour, stigmatisation, physical or psychological violence—and in seeking help from the appropriate services when needed.

THE RIGHT OF CHILDREN TO A HEALTHY ENVIRONMENT AND TO PARTICIPATION



In 2025, Terre des Hommes Suisse (TdH Suisse) intensified its commitment by helping children and young people in their role as actors of change for the defence of their rights. A total of 779 participation spaces were created or strengthened, enabling more than 99,000 children and young people to learn about their rights and carry out concrete actions.

CHILDREN'S CLUBS: WHERE CHILDREN LEARN TO BE ACTIVE CITIZENS

TdH Suisse supports children's clubs, which are non-formal learning spaces where children learn about their rights and engage in concrete actions within their schools and communities. Rooted in local daily life, these clubs represent the foundational level for children's participation and engagement as eco-citizens. In Mali, 45 clubs bring together 1,360 children and young people who meet regularly. In India, 216 clubs have mobilised more than 30,000 children and young people in 2025.

YOUTH COUNCILS: CARRYING CHILDREN'S VOICES TO THE HIGHEST LEVELS

Youth councils are representative bodies that enable children and young people to put forward their concerns to policymakers. In 2025, this engagement took on an unprecedented national dimension in Senegal.

Children supported by our local partner, EDEN, drafted a memorandum which was presented directly to the Prime Minister of Senegal. This was a powerful recognition of our work as a national reference point in promoting children's rights and participation. In response, the Prime Minister made concrete commitments: speeding up the adoption of the children's code, a strategy for street children, and strengthening the inclusion of children with disabilities. This demonstrates that genuine listening to children can give their voices the power to shape public policy.

SCHOOL PARLIAMENTS: TAKING PART IN SCHOOL GOVERNANCE

School parliaments are democratic spaces where pupils elect representatives to carry their voice to school management and teachers. TdH Suisse supports children in these bodies so that they can actively participate in the governance of their schools. In Bolivia, more than 7,000 children and young people have taken on active roles in student governments and school brigades (groups of pupils responsible for looking after their classmates within schools).

ENVIRONMENTAL INITIATIVES: LOCAL KNOWLEDGE FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

Protecting the environment is one of the issues that matters most to children. This is why our programmes connect environmental education with local realities, drawing on community knowledge while helping children develop practical skills. This approach takes different forms depending on the context. In Haiti, 450 children took part in plastic recycling and water-source restoration initiatives. In Senegal, educational gardens were established in partner schools. In India, the Indian Youth Council organised tree-planting activities at 40 sites and around 20 community clean-up campaigns, embedding environmental action in a practical, collective effort.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMUNICATION AND ADVOCACY: ECO-REPORTERS, NOW ACTIVE IN FIVE COUNTRIES

The project trains children and young people in field journalism, enabling them to document the environmental challenges affecting their communities, and to raise awareness among those around them about the issues, risks and good environmental practices. In Senegal, 28 children aged 11 to 15 documented marine pollution, deforestation and dwindling resources in Ndayane, proposing practical solutions in their articles.

In Colombia, the digital series "La Gota Se Agota", comprising eight videos on the right to water, combined audiovisual production with short training sessions in digital communication.

These productions have also gained wider recognition. In Peru, "Nuestra voz, nuestra agua" won the FONDEP award for the second consecutive year, helping to fund the school radio station.

OUR ACTIONS IN SWITZERLAND

In 2025, our Swiss programme transformed children's rights into concrete action: by mobilising more than 10,000 people in Geneva in support of children's rights in Peru, by helping to enshrine non-violent education in the Swiss Civil Code and by giving children a platform to present their projects to elected representatives. By creating meaningful opportunities for participation, civic engagement and structured advocacy, our work helps children understand their rights, exercise them and stand up for the rights of others.

34TH MARCHE DE L'ESPOIR (MARCH OF HOPE): A LASTING SPIRIT OF SOLIDARITY

The Marche de l'espoir (March of Hope) is TdH Suisse's flagship awareness-raising and civic engagement initiative. For 35 years, it has brought together thousands of children each year to become actors of change for children's rights and international solidarity. In 2025, the initiative unfolded in two complementary stages: first, 26,700 children learned about children's rights and the situation in Peru through classroom activities. Then, during the Marche de l'espoir (March of Hope) in October, they came together to raise more than CHF 203,000 in support of children in Peru. This journey from learning to action helps children experience solidarity first-hand and shows them that they, too, have the power to make a difference.

THE TERRE DES HOMMES SUISSE 5KM RUN: RUNNING FOR SOLIDARITY

On Saturday 11 October 2025, TdH Suisse launched a new event: the Terre des Hommes Suisse 5km run. This first edition brought together 500 participants. This sporting format reaches an audience keen to get involved beyond the school setting, broadening the spirit of solidarity carried by the Marche de l'espoir (March of Hope).

GIVING CHILDREN A VOICE: THE CHILDREN'S CONFERENCE

The Children's Conference for French-speaking Switzerland, organised in partnership with the Swiss Council of Youth Activities (CSAJ) and the Am Stram Gram Theatre, gives children aged 10 to 12 a meaningful opportunity each year to exercise their right to participate and experience democracy in action. 389 children from 18 classes and 3 residential homes across four French-speaking cantons learned about children's rights. Among them, 38 delegates elected by their classmates met in Lignerolle for a three-day conference focused on

food, health, family life and equality. In January 2026, they presented four project proposals to municipal, cantonal and federal elected representatives. Beyond the event itself, the children's proposals were submitted to the relevant authorities and helped drive concrete progress. One recommendation put forward at a previous Children's Conference helped persuade key parliamentarians, contributing to the 2025 amendment of the Swiss Civil Code guaranteeing children the right to a non-violent education.

ACTIVE ADVOCACY IN SWITZERLAND FOR CHILDREN'S RIGHTS AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

In 2025, the Terre des Hommes Suisse–Schweiz Alliance further strengthened its advocacy for children's rights in Switzerland and internationally. Through the Swiss Network for Children's Rights, which TdH Suisse chaired until April 2025, the Alliance helped advance key priorities, including the promotion of non-violent upbringing, improved data on children's well-being, and support for the development of a national children's strategy. It also contributed to the United Nations' review of Switzerland's commitments to children's rights.

The Alliance took on the co-chairmanship of the Agenda 2030 Platform, strengthening cooperation between civil society organisations, public authorities and other partners to accelerate action towards sustainable development. In particular, it advocated for every child's right to grow up in a healthy environment amid the growing impacts of climate change.

Finally, in collaboration with Alliance Sud, it carried out advocacy with members of Parliament to safeguard development cooperation funding, which is essential to protecting children's rights, ensuring access to education and sustainably improving children's living conditions.

OUR IMPLEMENTATION PARTNERS

LOCALISATION AS THE CORNERSTONE OF OUR OPERATIONAL MODEL

For Terre des Hommes Suisse (TdH Suisse), localisation is not just one principle among others: it is the very foundation of our operational model. We firmly believe that local organisations, rooted in their communities, are best placed to identify the priority needs of children and young people, and to provide relevant and sustainable solutions. This is why our work relies exclusively on partnerships with these organisations on the ground.

In 2025, we worked with 44 partner organisations in Latin America, Africa, Haiti and India, providing them with financial and technical support to strengthen their capacity to act. These partnerships, built on shared values, trust and mutual respect, not only concretely improve the living conditions of children and young people, but also help foster a strong, independent local civil society.

2025 also marked the end of our programme cycle in Brazil, after many years of supporting local partners committed to the rights of rural young people. This transition is a tangible example of successful localisation: our Brazilian partners have now taken full ownership of the programme, contributing to the long-term strengthening of civil society.

VOICES FROM THE FIELD

In this section, we hear from those who experience our programmes first-hand. Their testimonies offer an authentic insight into the realities on the ground and the changes taking place.

BURKINA FASO

HELPING PREVENT CHILDREN FROM GOING MISSING

In a country facing a deep security and humanitarian crisis, protecting children has become an everyday imperative. In villages hosting internally displaced people, Community Child Protection Units (CCPEs), supported by TdH Suisse and its partners, are on the front line. Ouedraogo Rasmané, a member of one of these units, describes the changes he has seen in his community since its capacity was strengthened.



"Children are more actively involved in matters that concern them. The project has also helped bring many out-of-school pupils back into education."

BURKINA FASO AND THE WORK OF TERRE DES HOMMES SUISSE

In Burkina Faso, the security crisis has caused massive population displacement, exposing thousands of children to serious risks: dropping out of school, exploitation at gold panning sites, and the breakdown of family and community ties. Faced with this reality, TdH Suisse and its partners have strengthened community child protection mechanisms, particularly the CCPE, to maintain local protection spaces where institutional structures are weakened or absent.

I had the honour of reading out and handing over Senegal's national children's memorandum to the Prime Minister, a powerful moment of mobilisation and advocacy, a symbol of all the work that has been done. These experiences have allowed me to proudly carry our values and our needs, and to be a voice for those who are not always heard."



SENEGAL

ADVOCATING TO THE PRIME MINISTER FOR THEIR RIGHTS TO BE RESPECTED

In 2025, Senegal held an unprecedented national consultation to gather children's views on their rights and needs. This process, led by the Directorate in charge of Child Protection and supported by the EDEN clubs, a direct partner of TdH Suisse, resulted in the drafting of a memorandum which was submitted to the Prime Minister. To present it, the children made a unanimous choice: Myriam, a young member of the EDEN club.



PERU

CHILD TRAFFICKING IN THE ANDES AND THE AMAZON

Human trafficking, particularly of minors, is one of the most serious violations of children's rights in Peru. In the Andean and Amazonian regions, children and adolescents are exposed to recruitment networks that exploit economic instability and the isolation of communities. Our local partner explains the mechanisms behind this recruitment and the key actions to address it.

"We work in an area heavily affected by illegal gold mining and deforestation, activities that have serious consequences for the local social fabric."

PERU AND THE WORK OF TERRE DES HOMMES SUISSE

In 2024, 1,908 cases of trafficking were recorded in Peru. To tackle this scourge, TdH Suisse acts on two levels: at the institutional level, by sitting on the National Standing Commission against Trafficking and contributing to the development of a national child protection protocol; and at the community level, by organising awareness workshops in Andean schools and villages to inform parents and adolescents about traffickers' methods.

INDIA

FIGHTING EARLY MARRIAGE TO PROTECT GIRLS' RIGHTS

In India, a 17-year-old girl, a member of the Indian Youth Council, speaks about a silent reality: despite the risks it poses to girls' education, health and safety, early marriage persists, sometimes encouraged by influential adults within communities.



INDIA AND THE WORK OF TERRE DES HOMMES SUISSE

In Indian slums, TdH Suisse and its partners support young people so that they can exercise their rights and make free choices, safe from community pressure. This grassroots work aims to reduce forced marriage and allow adolescent girls to continue their education and pursue their life plans.

"There are many older people who support this practice, which leads to an increase in early marriages."

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS 2025

In 2025, Terre des Hommes Suisse recorded a deficit of CHF 362,762.

Its income amounted to close to CHF 7.9 million, of which 39% came from public contributions, 30% from private donations and bequests, and 15% from international donors. This represents a 15% decrease compared with 2024, due to a reduction in public support as well as greater demand and competition for the same donors.

The organisation adapted its spending to the reality of its funding, reducing its international programme costs by 7% (notably following its withdrawal from Brazil) and cutting its Swiss programme costs by 28% compared with 2024. At the same time, the organisation succeeded in significantly reducing its administrative costs, down 20% on the previous year.

Terre des Hommes Suisse continues to seek to diversify its sources of income, by strengthening its teams' fundraising capacities and by exploring new collaborations with institutional donors, foundations and private-sector partners. The organisation also maintains an ongoing reflection on how it works with its partners, with a constant focus on using the funds received efficiently and appropriately, with a view to long-term sustainability.

Your support, whether through regular donations or bequests, remains the pillar of our work. In 2025, the public's generosity allowed us to maintain our impact for children and young people. Every contribution, whatever its size, translates directly into concrete changes in the lives of our beneficiaries.

This report offers you the complete transparency that we consider essential to maintaining your trust and continuing our mission to defend children's rights. We warmly thank you for your invaluable support.

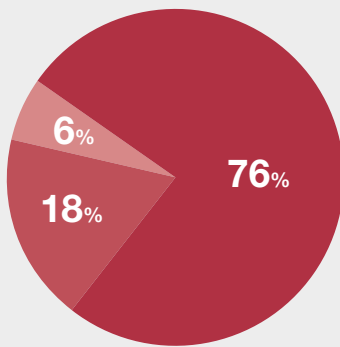

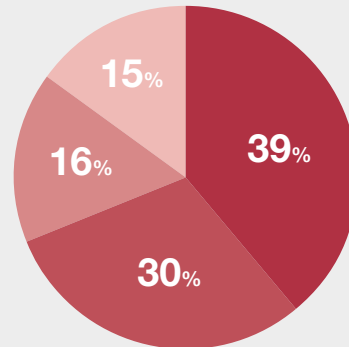
Breakdown of expenses (%)

- Administration

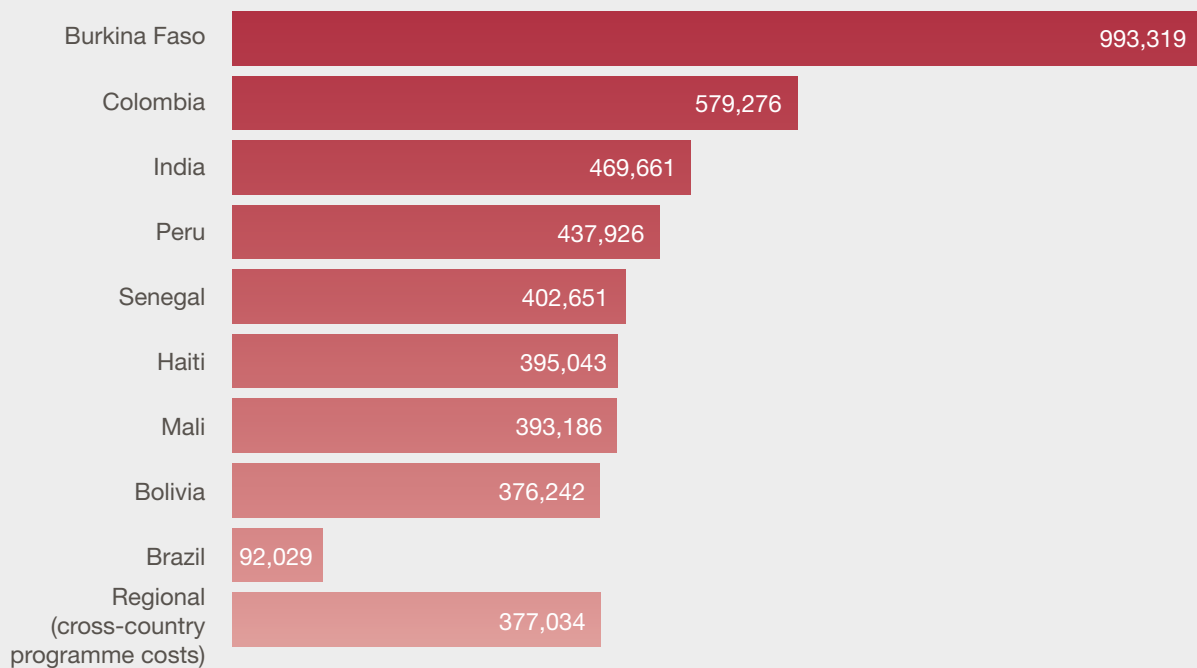


Sources of income (%)

FINANCIAL REPORT

Notes to the 2025 annual financial statements

1. Accounting principles and valuation policies

Reporting framework

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Swiss GAAP FER (the Core FER and FER 21), the Swiss Code of Obligations, the requirements of the ZEWO Foundation, and the Association's statutes. The annual financial statements give a true and fair view of the Association's assets, financial position and results.

The financial year covers the period from 1 January to 31 December 2025. The accounts are kept in Swiss francs (CHF). These financial statements are presented together with comparative figures for the 2024 financial year, which were audited by CF Compagnie fiduciaire de révision SA (report dated 10 April 2025).

Foreign currency translation

During the year, transactions in foreign currencies are translated into CHF at the Oanda exchange rate prevailing on the date of the transaction. At year-end, assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into CHF at the official tax reference exchange rate used in Geneva as at 31 December 2025. The resulting exchange differences are recognised in the statement of operations.

Reclassification of 2024 comparative figures

To ensure the comparability of the financial statements, certain figures for the 2024 financial year have been reclassified to conform to the presentation adopted in 2025. Two reclassifications were made:

a) Restricted and unrestricted income: an amount of CHF 54,000 previously presented as unrestricted income was reclassified as restricted income, to reflect the restricted nature of contributions related to covering overhead costs.

b) Income and personnel costs: an amount of CHF 51'000 previously recognised as income was reclassified as a reduction in personnel costs under the administration line, in line with the net presentation principle applicable to this type of reimbursement. These reclassifications have no impact on the result for the 2024 financial year, nor on total equity as at 31 December 2024.

2. Other information

In-kind donations and services received free of charge

In accordance with FER 21, significant in-kind donations and services provided free of charge are disclosed in the notes where they are not fully recognised in the statement of operations.

In-kind contribution from the City of Geneva: CHF 45,432 for the Marche de l'Espoir (March of Hope) (CHF 51,328 in 2024). The schools and childhood institutions department of the City of Geneva's social cohesion and solidarity directorate generously makes premises available to Terre des Hommes Suisse in a City of Geneva primary school. The value of this contribution, in terms of the rent for the offices and storage space provided free of charge, is estimated at between CHF 248,360 and CHF 274,970, as in 2024.

Gifts in kind recognised in the statement of operations correspond to clothing collection containers, valued at CHF 45,000 in 2025 (CHF 90,920 in 2024).

Volunteering

For many years, Terre des Hommes Suisse has benefited from the commitment of its volunteers. In accordance with FER 21, the value of volunteer work is disclosed off-balance-sheet and is not recognised in the statement of operations.

In total, 460 volunteers contributed 4,893 hours of work to project groups, communications, administration, and our various events in 2025. The eight Committee members, for their part, contributed close to 350 hours of work. At CHF 30 per hour, the total value of all volunteer contributions over 2025 amounts to CHF 157,290.

Report of the statutory auditor on the limited statutory examination

As statutory auditor, we have examined the annual financial statements (balance sheet, statement of operations, cash flow statement, statement of changes in capital and notes) of the association Terre des Hommes Suisse (Section Romande) for the year ended 31 December 2025.

These financial statements are the responsibility of the Committee, while our role is to express an opinion on them based on our examination. We confirm that we meet the legal requirements of licensing and independence.

Our examination was conducted in accordance with the Swiss Standard on Limited Statutory Examination. This standard requires that the examination be planned and performed in such a way as to identify significant misstatements in the annual financial statements. A limited statutory examination consists primarily of inquiries and analytical procedures, as well as appropriate detailed testing of the documents available within the audited entity. The verification of operating flows and the internal control system, as well as inquiries and other procedures designed to detect fraud or other legal violations, do not form part of this examination.

Based on our examination, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the annual financial

statements, which show total assets of CHF 4,770,394 and a result of CHF -362,762, do not give a true and fair view of the assets, financial position and results in accordance with Swiss GAAP FER, and do not comply with Swiss law and the Association's statutes.

TERRE DES HOMMES SUISSE: AN INTERCONNECTED NETWORK FOR ACTION

To amplify its impact in favour of children's rights, Terre des Hommes Suisse (TdH Suisse) draws on a network of partnerships at different levels. These collaborations, both local and international, strengthen the organisation's capacity to act and help make the voices of the children it supports heard.

In Switzerland and internationally: a networked engagement to amplify our impact

At national and international levels, TdH Suisse is actively involved in several strategic networks. Our participation in the Swiss Network for Children's Rights and the Agenda 2030 Platform strengthens our advocacy for policies that respect fundamental rights. As a member of the international Joining Forces alliance, we join hands with other major organisations to maximise our impact in favour of children's rights.

Aware of the climate emergency and its impact on children's rights, we have joined the Climate Action Accelerator- an initiative that helps us reduce our carbon footprint and develop sustainable solutions within our organisation.

In the field of education, we contribute to sharing expertise through the Swiss Network for International Cooperation in Education (RECI) and the Réseau écoles21, as well as taking part in exchanges within the education network of the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC). Our collaboration with the Swiss Council of Youth Activities (CSAJ) has made possible the Romandy Children's Conference, giving a voice to the youngest.

We are also active members of platforms such as the Swiss-Haiti Platform and the Swiss-Colombia Platform, which allow us to coordinate our work with other Swiss stakeholders in those countries. As a member of Alliance Sud, we work towards a more coherent and supportive Swiss foreign policy. Our valued partnership with Swiss Solidarity (Chaîne du Bonheur) supports several of our education and protection projects.

At a more local level, TdH Suisse is a member of the Geneva Federation for Cooperation (FGC), the leading body for international solidarity in Geneva, which brings together and strengthens the work of member organisations for a lasting impact in the service of the most vulnerable populations. We have developed excellent synergies with both the City and the Canton of Geneva. These collaborations are essential to organising the Marche de l'espoir (March of Hope) and the Children's Conference for French-speaking Switzerland, and for our work as a whole.

Terre des Hommes Suisse within the Terre des Hommes Movement

TdH Suisse is a member of the Terre des Hommes Movement, coordinated by the International Federation of Terre des Hommes (IFTDH). This federation includes independent organisations, such as Terre des Hommes Germany, Terre des Hommes Italia and terre des hommes schweiz in Basel, which share a common vision for the defence of children's rights.

Since 2019, TdH Suisse and terre des hommes Schweiz have strengthened their collaboration by forming a formal alliance. We act together, both in our countries of operation and in Switzerland, to raise public awareness and carry out advocacy with the authorities on issues relating to development policy and children's rights.

Alongside this alliance, TdH Suisse has also developed a close partnership with Terre des Hommes Germany, specifically for our work in Mali and Burkina Faso.

Ethical commitment and transparency

TdH Suisse operates in line with the highest standards of transparency, quality and protection. The organisation is certified with the Zewo label, which attests to rigorous fund management, clear communication and genuine social impact. This recognition strengthens the trust of donors, partners and the public in the integrity of our work. Furthermore, TdH Suisse is also a member, through the Terre des Hommes Federation, of an international network of organisations committed to keeping children safe.
